

**TOURISM-LED ECONOMIC DEVELOPMENT AND EMPLOYMENT GENERATION :
EVIDENCE FROM REWA DISTRICT, MADHYA PRADESH**

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Abstract

Tourism is recognized as a vital sector for economic development and employment generation, particularly in developing regions of India. This study examines the economic impact of tourism and its role in local employment generation in Rewa District, Madhya Pradesh. The research is based on a descriptive and analytical methodology using both primary data (field visits, interviews, and observations) and secondary data (government reports, tourism statistics, and academic literature). The study identifies that Rewa District possesses significant tourism potential due to its natural attractions such as waterfalls, along with historical and cultural heritage sites. It emphasizes the need for infrastructure improvement, skill development, community participation, and adoption of sustainable tourism practices to maximize economic gains and ensure long-term development.

tourism development [6]. The district is particularly प्रसिद्ध for its magnificent waterfalls such as Keoti, Chachai, and Bahuti, which attract a large number of visitors, especially during the monsoon season. In addition, historical sites like Rewa Fort and Govindgarh Palace, along with various religious places, enhance the tourism appeal of the region.

Tourism in Rewa has the potential to significantly contribute to the local economy by generating income and employment opportunities. Studies suggest that tourism development leads to the growth of small businesses, increased demand for local products, and improved livelihoods of local communities [10].
